What's your motive?

n the Seventh-day Adventist Encyclopedia there is a preacher by the name of D.M. Canright. He lived from 1840 to 1919. He was a brilliant, gifted man who could keep his audience spellbound, and was ordained to Adventist ministry at the age of 25.

Evidently during his early training, as the story goes, two theology students were sent to preach, and each was to critique the other. It was Canright's turn, and he described the glories of the new earth. That afternoon Canright asked his friend, "Well, how did I do?" To which his friend replied, "I don't know. I got so caught up in the message, I forgot to critique." At that point Canright asserted, "If it were not for this message, I could be a great man!"

Records show that Canright was a forceful preacher, a polemic writer, and an able administrator, but intolerant, opinionated, and chafed under ministerial control. In 1887 he left the Adventist Church and joined the Baptist ministry.

Evidently sometimes right actions can come from wrong motives. Jesus clearly stated that right actions must stem from pure motives when He said, "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God" (Matthew 5:8). It's intriguing that the rest of chapter 5 and 6 discuss the issues of motives.

In Jesus' day the orthodox Jews identified three great pillars of good life: almsgiving, fasting, and prayer. To do these would ascribe you as a righteous person, and assure you of eternal life. No wonder Jesus addressed the motives of these three issues, stressing that unless your "righteousness exceeds the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees; you cannot enter the kingdom of heaven." Listen to what He says. "Take heed that you do not do your charitable deeds

(alms) before men, to be seen by them..." (Mt. 6:1); And when you pray, you shall not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray, standing in the synagogues and on the corners of the street, that they may be seen by men (V 5). Finally He addresses fasting. "Moreover, when you fast, do not be like the hypocrites, with a sad countenance. For they disfigure their faces that they may appear to men to be fasting "(v16). Of the three, almsgiving was the chief virtue.

Having introduced the subject of motives, why do we volunteer for service? William Barkley contends there are three main reasons.

- 1. Out a sense of duty. Catherine Cardwell in her autobiography, Lying Awake says, "Giving was regarded as a duty, but often with the giving there was a moral lecture which provided a smug pleasure for the person who gave it." She tells of her father going to the cells at the police station on Sunday afternoons, bailing out the weekend drunks so they wouldn't lose their jobs Monday morning. Each was asked to pay it back out of the next week's wages. He always included a smug lecture with his giving. Barkley continues, "When he gives from a sense of duty, even...Christian duty...one thing he never gives is himself, and therefore the giving is incomplete."
- 2. It gives a feeling of prestige. Having done a good deed we gain a feeling of superiority when we compare ourselves with others.
- 3. Because our heart compels us, we can do no other. This is the pure motive Jesus spoke about in Matthew 5:8.

In the 1700's James Bothwell wrote a biography about his friend Dr. Samuel Johnson. Coming home late one night Johnson found a

poor woman lying on the street so exhausted she could not walk. He carried her to his house when he discovered she was a prostitute who had fallen into poverty and disease. Instead of upbraiding her, he nursed her back to health at considerable expense; then found a respectable job for her. For all this all Johnson got was suspicion about his own character. When asked how he could stand having his house full of these undeserving people, he answered, "If I do not assist them, no one else will, and they must not be lost for want."

So how do our motives rate? My guess is that when we open ourselves to Jesus, it will be from a pure heart. -Ken Wiebe

Kaylie's cope with hope

Through hardship comes hope and grace.

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n April 30, ADRA Connections Peru participants boarded the first flight of a mountain-top adventure. Participants distributed lifesaving Alpaca blankets to beneficiaries at 13,950 feet above sea level, built ecostoves with local trainers, and provided children with warm winter coats and hats to ward off the killing affects of the annual cold-wave.

Each year, an estimated 51,000 Peruvian children and elderly suffer from severe respiratory illnesses, and last year more than 300 succumbed to illness as a result of the killing cold experienced in the mountain villages of Peru. This year Canadians made a difference in three communities. One thousand at-risk children and elderly community members were identified by ADRA and selected to receive Alpaca Blankets ADRA supporters purchased from the ADRA Gift Catalogue. The ADRA Connections participants travelled two hours by bus "over several sections of dusty, dirt road that shook [them] to the core" to fulfill the distribution, said Marie.

The group was greeted by an enormous crowd. Shy smiles, handshakes

and informal greetings were given, followed by official speeches and welcomes from community officials. Over the next three hours, mothers, fathers, children and the elderly waited in the hot sun as registrations were verified and the blankets distributed. In addition, a group of 220 children, aged six to nine, received winter coats and hats. These children were identified during the blanket distribution selection process, as being unable to afford these items and at-risk as a result.

Also on this trip, local trainers and Connections participants worked side by side over several days learning to build eco-stoves. "The eco-stoves are an important development tool in Peru. Open-fire cook stoves provide a serious health hazard in the homes here. Children in these homes are suffering severe mental and physical developmental stunting. The smoke being inhaled is the equivalent of smoking four to five cigarettes daily. Not to mention the number of severe burns suffered by men, women and children annually as a result of falling on the fires," said Liz Horniachek, ADRA Canada Connections Coordinator. The eco-stoves, when properly constructed, are vented to the outside, eliminating some of the associated health-risks of 'burn-stoves'. Additionally, their completely enclosed construction requires less fuel to run, saving the beneficiaries the cost of fuel.

Connections Trips provide assistance to the most vulnerable, and introduce participants to a unique experience in development. Every effort is made to ensure trips support the local economy and do not have a negative impact on local workers. God is faithful to His word and promise



In today's technically connected society of social networks, blogging sites, video posts, cyber chat, more and more people are relying on the information highway to connect, to find, and to share.

It reminds me of a Bible text in Matthew 7:7, "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you."

The Internet has become a place to bond and belong.

If that's where today's society is at, if that's where people are going to Ask, Seek and Knock, then we must find ways to connect and provide the information that will lead them to Jesus.

It's true that if your church is not on the internet, to most people you don't exist.

Let me introduce you to the Adventist Church and School Connect content management system. It is a powerful website management tool that the North American Division is providing free to every Seventh-day Adventist church and school in Bermuda, Canada, and the United States.

The North American Division has contracted AdventSource to provide customer training, support, and marketing for Adventist Church and School Connect for the approximately 3600 church and school websites.

Many people are intimidated by the word "website" because it has gained a reputation from the past as being a complicated and highly technical procedure. Well, that is not the case anymore.

With ACC's content management system, you don't have to know a website programming language like html or php to add content and photos to your website. You can edit pages as you would in a word processor similar to Microsoft Word.

Denis Prescott, a member of the Merritt Seventh-day Adventist Church, has been maintaining his church's ACC website for four years. I recently spoke to Denis about his experience and thoughts regarding



the ACC platform and this is what he said, "The ease of adding and or editing information makes for an awesome tool".

There are many useful features available with ACC websites such as:

- Built-in member, author, editor and administrator user levels.
- Prayer request feature allows site visitors to submit prayer requests.
- Dynamic RSS content such as daily devotionals.
- Calendar allows departments to enter and categorize their own events.
- Adventist Church News from the North American Division, Adventist News Network, and Adventist Review.

Next time I will go into more detail regarding my opinion of the most useful ACC features and share with you some examples.

With the rapid increase of mobile Internet devices, it is important that these devices can process and display your church website content. That is why all ACC websites are now mobile device friendly. When a mobile device accesses an ACC website, a custom mobile template is activated with the content and sent to the mobile display.

Here is an online list of the Alberta Conference church websites http:// www.adventistchurchconnect.com/ acc_report_ab.php. Remember, you are not alone when it comes to maintaining an ACC website. AdventSource provides training and support free of charge.

There are many helpful resources available on the ACC help website such as: live online video training, archived video tutorials, information about local training events, e-mail support, and step-by-step how to guides. The help website is located at http://help.adventistchurchconnect.com.

s children, my brother Alex and I were familiar with being sent to various day camps throughout the summer. Both our parents worked during the day and did not like to see us sitting around the house. Each summer we were enrolled in a variety of day camps (usually run through the YMCA). However, in 2003, due to an overlapping holiday, YMCA camps were not running for one week. My parents quickly searched for an alternative camp to send Alex and I to. As they discussed several prospective camps, my Mom spotted a brochure for Foothills Camp. I'm unsure how that brochure came into our possession, however, mom and dad seemed very intrigued with the picture of a child waterskiing on the front page. It was very fortunate that the week specialized for children age 10-12 (I was 11 at this time) coincided exactly with the week that the YMCA camp was cancelled because I was available to attend Foothills Camp for the first time. At this point I had never been to an overnight camp but I was excited for a new experience. My brother, on the other hand, who was then 10 years old, had refused to join me.

I treasure the time I spent at Foothills Camp very much. Since I had not grown up in a religious household, I learned about God for the first time that summer. I was fascinated by all the Bible stories and new information I was hearing about God from the pastors and camp counsellors. I had made some very good friends at camp and I dreaded leaving. I cried so much on the drive home that my parents decided to turn around and take me back for a second week at camp.

I began middle school after that summer. Although I had enjoyed much of my experience in elementary school I found seventh grade to be much different. My parents had sent me to a French school and I was completely miserable the entire year. My friends from elementary school had gone elsewhere and I was very lonely. I found the teachers either rude and abusive or completely indifferent. I was failing two of my classes. I did not care for the atmosphere of that school or the people in it. I tried not to be negatively influenced by my exposure to that environment. I hated school and I would try to stop going. Soon I began to hate my life and took out my anger on my parents. They still remember that year as well as I do.

When summer finally approached, I desperately wanted to return to Foothills Camp. The second summer certainly didn't disappoint me. The people were different at Foothills: kind, caring, full of love. It was that summer that I remember talking with kids who also lived

in Calgary. They mentioned that they attend a school called Chinook Winds Adventist Academy (CWAA). Without any further knowledge of this school, I had decided that I too wanted to attend CWAA and was utterly determined to go.

This idea, of course, did not go over well with my parents. They were not supportive of this decision and absolutely refused to ever let me attend CWAA. They did, however, understand that I did not want to return to my previous school and respected my request to change schools. Instead they simply sent me to a different public school. That school, however, did not seem any different to me. It was just not what my heart was set on. About a week into the school year I flatly refused to go. As I was behaving so defiantly, my

parents, perhaps realizing that attending CWAA was better than not attending school at all, agreed to send me.

I knew I was where I was meant to be as soon as I walked into Chinook Winds. The snobbiness and indifference I was used to had been replaced with friendly smiles and warm welcomes. The teachers cared about my scholastic progress and took time to treat me as an individual. I appreciated the opportunities that were provided for me. After each school year my Dad would try to convince me to go back to public school but every year I refused.

I'm currently taking a Biology degree at Canadian University College and starting my fourth summer working at Foothills Camp as a lifeguard.

I am very blessed that the experiences I had at Foothills Camp led me into a personal relationship with Jesus and I was baptized in 2008 at the Calgary Parkdale Adventist Church.

As a result, summer camp is a mission that has become very close to my heart. The opportunity to attend summer camp can be taken for granted by many children and the impact it can have may be overlooked by many adults. It is important for me to express the value of summer camp and the potential it has to make a difference in lives. I am very grateful that God somehow led me to Foothills Camp and I pray that other children are able to have the same fulfilling experience. —Andrea Leaist

Kaylie's Cope with Hope

hen I reached out to my fellow members at Edmonton South with an idea for an outreach to the Stollery Children's Hospital called Kaylie's Cope with Hope Pack, they embraced the project immediately with donations coming in quickly. An approximate total of \$3600 has come in since May 2011. The feelings and stress experienced when your child is first admitted to the hospital can be overwhelming. On June 28, 2009, we rushed into the Emergency at the Stollery Children's Hospital with a feverish child and did not leave for two weeks. Nothing could have prepared us for our daughter Kaylie's diagnosis, Leukemia. When you are struck with news of a critically ill child, the last thing you want to think about is finding toothbrushes!

Kaylie's Cope with Hope Pack is in response to our own experience of having to scramble to get together those items needed for an unexpected stay at the hospital. This care pack is a way of saying, you're not alone, we've been here and there is hope. Our goal is to help ease the stress and offer support to newly admitted children and their families, as they begin to cope with this new reality of a critically sick child and needing to be by their side 24/7.

The youth of the Kingdom Seekers Pathfinder Club have been a great

help. Bev and Mark Prangle and Carol Neptune did a fabulous job organizing the Pathfinders and we completed 30 packs and 30 encouragement cards during one evening meeting in June and 30 packs in November and February. The Club also donated pens, notebooks and activity books for the packs.

A small group of ladies volunteered their time, talents and tools for a few hours in November to create beautifully decorated hand-made encouragement cards, which are signed by church members. The Kindergarten, Primary and Junior classes are also doing their part in supporting this local mission project through collecting pennies, new stuffies and crayon packs.

By the end of May 2012, 120 "Kay-lie's Cope with Hope Packs" have been delivered to the Child Life Department at the Stollery Children's Hospital. The staff were impressed with the cheery pictures our children coloured on the bags and have expressed their gratitude to all who have contributed to this project which "has helped brighten the days of many children, and their families" during their stay at the Stollery Children's Hospital.

Although policies at the Hospital do not currently allow us to include messages of a religious nature, being able to encourage others is a gift, and the opportunity that has been given to make a difference is tremendous. Sadly, 10 packs a month does not even come close to meeting the number of children that are admitted with critical conditions.

Transform Me (Women's Ministries)



The World Health Organization estimates that about one-third of all deaths in the world are caused by infectious diseases (such as the various strains of influenza also known as "the flu," Malaria, Tuberculosis, and HIV). Dr. Babiuk's special interest and work within infectious diseases lies in virology and immunology and vaccine research. He has published over 500 peer-reviewed manuscripts, 100 book chapters and review articles, and holds 36 issued patents (with 13 patents pending).

In 2005, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation awarded Dr. Babiuk and his colleagues at Vaccine and Infectious Disease Organization (VIDO) \$5.6-million to develop a single-dose vaccine to protect newborns against Pertussis (whooping cough) which annually kills 400,000 babies - without the use of needles, a novel approach by nasal spray (a new frontier in vaccine delivery and efficacy). He is credited for helping to develop a vaccine for rotavirus, in animals and humans, which globally causes half a million deaths per year in humans and hundreds of millions of dollars lost to farmers in livestock. It is by his leadership and vision, that he took VIDO (in his native Saskatoon) from a group of a few individuals and built it up into

the internationally recognized vaccine research powerhouse that it is today. Last year in September 2011 Prime Minister Stephen Harper was at hand to officially open the \$140-million specialized InterVac Facility at VIDO.

Tiresome and tedious at times. research and its results take years, sometimes decades. Through his passion and persistence spanning over 30 years of a career in medical research, Dr. Babiuk has netted the highest civilian honour in the nation – appointed Officer in the Order of Canada, in 2005. Despite all the accomplishments and accolades, he is known by his colleagues as humble and down-to-earth. He and his wife regularly worship at Edmonton South, but until the recent recognition

at church his amazing work and accomplishments went unbeknownst to our own congregation. During this service, we thanked him for his inspiring work while remaining faithful to God (not always easy in a secular academic setting) and Pastor John Murley was at hand to present him with a special model, a statue of Christ giving counsel with his hand on a pondering professor's shoulder. A bouquet of flowers were offered to his wife Betty Lou as well, for her patience and support over all the years. At the presentation, it was described that his faith and testimony was "like an injection of spiritual immunization!"

The Harvest

What if no one's home? What if no one's interested? What if they run into someone who is hostile with them at the door?

There were about 12 of us ready to go door-to-door on a Sunday afternoon. We paired everyone up and had a crash course lesson on how to approach the door. Then someone gave a short devotional and we prayed. I handed out the contact lists and away we went. We were doing follow-up visitations on It Is Written contacts who had previously shown some form of spiritual interest. Each pair had about 6 to 8 contacts to try and reach in about an hour and a half.

As everyone started to head out the door of the church the worry started to set in. I was glad people were eager and willing, but as a Bible worker I know how hard door-to-door work can be at times. As willing as people were most of them were also quite green at this type of thing. What if no one's home? What if no one's interested? What if they run into someone who is hostile with them at the door? What if there is no positive experience to be had from this and it crushes their willingness? I was praying "Lord at least let them have positive conversations."

As the pairs started to trickle back to the church I was eager yet doubtful to hear what happened to them. To my surprise all but the most experienced pair had a positive out-

ing and came back very excited.

Afterwards, while I was talking with the Lord, He reminded me of a lesson that He tries to teach but I often find hard to learn. He reminded me of the parable found in Matthew Chapter 9; the harvest was plentiful. If the harvest was plentiful to those whom Jesus was speaking to how much more plentiful is it to you and I today? And it has been my experience that whenever I'm a faithful "worker" I recognize the truth of Christ's promise. Why then do I struggle to believe it?

As Jesus describes, the problem is with the workers and not the harvest. This thought is echoed in Acts of the Apostles page 109 when Ellen White says, "All over the world men and women are looking wistfully to heaven. Prayers and tears and inquiries go up from souls longing for light, for grace, for the Holy Spirit. Many are on the verge of the kingdom, waiting only to be gathered in."

As God still patiently works with me I want to be determined to not allow false fears, negative experiences, and ideological differences to keep me from being a worker. The harvest is plentiful. Be one of the few. — James Wesley is a bible worker at the Calgary Central Church

Imagine yourself debt free

"What a joy to wake up in the morning and find yourself debt free"! For most of us that statement is just a dream but for the 54 participants who attended the Edmonton South Financial Peace Seminar that dream is much closer to reality, especially if they continue to practice the seven baby steps to financial freedom as taught by author, speaker and radio personality Dave Ramsey.

"The Financial Peace Seminar was offered by Edmonton South as one component of reaching out to our community" says Pastor John Murley, Senior Pastor. It is in keeping with the statement made by E.G. White in her book Ministry of Healing where she states on page 143, "The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence. Then He bade them, Follow Me."

At Edmonton South we have determined that our Church must reach out to our community and help meet the needs that exist. The importance for families to rid themselves of the heavy debt loads that they carry was one such need identified.

A total of 54 people took the 13 week course, that started in late January and ended in late April. The group who met weekly, were led by the DVD teaching of popular radio host Dave Ramsey. That was supplemented by our local coordinator Pastor Murley who led the group in discussion and homework assignments.

At the conclusion of the 13 weeks the group had paid off collectively \$126,000 in debt and had a combined amount of \$153,325.00 in overall savings. "This is a fantastic report" says Pastor Murley, "but the best part of the seminar was that we made friends with several non-members who attended our church for 13 weeks and are now excited about coming back to other programs that we offer, such as Marriage on the Rock and Creation Health."


In memory






