"ADRA Canada's most recent shipping of food to the starving people of Ethiopia is being loaded this week and will leave Montreal on March 13," states Earl Coupland. "One hundred and seventy-five tonnes of Canadian-grown whole-grain wheat and cracked wheat will be shipped for free distribution in Ethiopia," he added. Earl Coupland is director of ADRA Canada's food shipping. He purchases the food and coordinates the shipments for overseas. Food has been sent to Ethiopia, other places in Africa, and Chile.

CHURCH OFFICERS DEDICATED

The Sylvan Lake Seventh-Day Adventist Church officers were dedicated for the Lord's service in a special service Friday evening, January 3.

Dr. Scott Smith, head elder, appealed to the officers and members to a greater dedication of their lives to the Lord. It's time, he said, that we examine our Christian experience and strengthen our relationship with the Lord.

Herb Hockley, personal ministries leader, represented all the departments of the church. He illustrated the importance of every officer in the church with a long paper chain. On the links he had written the names of all church posi-

tions such as elder, deacon, deaconess, Sabbath School superintendent, secretary, SS teachers, division leaders, teachers, assistants, youth, and all other departments.

Large letters on several links spaced throughout the length of the chain spelled C-H-U-R-C-H. Brother Hockley stressed the importance of every position and member of the church. If one member fails to accept and fulfill his or her duty and responsibility, the chain_ breaks.

Each individual should determine that the chain will not break at his or her link. Putting it another way, "The line shall not

break where I stand." This should be our individual goal. One break in the chain affects the usefulness and effectiveness of the whole chain, and likewise the whole church suffers when one member is absent or is not fulfilling his or her duties.

Pastor Levern Krenzler officiated in the dedication service conducted like a church dedication. In the time of the children of Israel there were dedications of many kinds. If we really believe that Jesus is coming soon, we need to draw close to the Lord. If we really believe it, our lives will show it in service for Him.

You, like the rest of us, are extremely busy I am sure, and time is of premium value. Trying to get 26 hours of work packed into a 24-hour day is a constant battle. There are priority items that have to be done and there are some items that can slide until the next day and the next day . . .

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Our priorities today are to have a church membership ready for the coming of Jesus Christ. Nothing is more important than that! Everything in this church must center around the nurture of its members and the sharing in a caring way to the masses of our planet.

The church is called to be evangelistic. It would be selfish and selfdepreciating to know and enjoy the gospel and keep it all to ourselves. During the 1,000 Days of Reaping the Alberta Conference membership had a part in seeing 1,000 baptisms take place. Today the conference has 6,850 total membership. Our objective for HARVEST 90 is 1,990 baptisms by the year 1990, or 400 baptisms a year for the next five years. The net membership in 1990 should be very close to 9,000 members.

The Alberta Conference **Executive Committee officers** and departmental directors are taking this objective very seriously. A total conference program is being carefully studied and will be voted on at the next Alberta Conference Executive Committee meeting on February 23. Along with the program will be a process of evaluation and accountability to measure the results of these objectives as time goes by.


YOUTH LEADERSHIP WEEKEND

A Youth Leadership Seminar was held at Canadian Union College on February 7 and 8.

Friday evening vespers began with singing and the introduction of the Youth Ministries directors from across Canada, campus chaplains, and special guests. The unique sound of the "The Directors Four,"-a Youth Ministries directors quartet, made their weekend debut. The group, made up of Lloyd Janzen of the Alberta Conference, Brian Lee of the Ontario Conference, Bob Lehmann of the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference. and lee Patterson of the Maritime Conference, sang a couple of selections, with Janzen playing the guitar and Patterson playing the wash-tub bass.

A talk was given by Elder Perry Parks, Canadian Union Youth Ministries director, entitled "Youth--the Church of Today." Using various illustrations, Parks directed his message to the youth, citing, "You are not only the future, but you are the NOW." After this inspiring talk, the congregation saw a beautiful multi-media presentation produced by Law-



rence and Diane Burns. An "AFTERGLOW" program topped the evening with singing, testimony sharing, and a unique finish of prayer and song around little fire pots outside the church.

Sabbath morning, the Sabbath School was put on by Elder Lloyd Janzen. Highlights of the program included singing, music by "The Directors Four," a play about the Waldenses, a live conference telephone call from Elder Neal Wilson, President of the General Conference, a special music selection hand-signed by Judy Blake, and finished with a lesson study lead out by Elder Victor Fitch, Education director for the Canadian Union Conference.

The church service began with CUC's vocal group "New Dawn." Elder Les Pitton, Youth Ministries director for North American Division, delivered a keynote address. Among his comments, he emphasized, "The purpose of the church is to carry the message of a loving and redeeming Saviour to a lost world....Young adults must be involved in carrying this message," and he continued, "The church needs young adults who are willing to live their lives as Christians in everyday society."

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The afternoon offered a series of seminars and computer health appraisals. Some of the seminar topics were: "Youth Needs of the '80's," "Self Esteem," "Parent-Teen Relationships," "Peer Counseling," "Opportunities - Mission Service." The seminars and health appraisals were well received.

Saturday evening began with the film entitled "Never Ashamed." After the film Steve Varro, a S.D.A. Christian illusionist/ speaker, highlighted the night with both his secular and sacred programs. Varro, a former entertainer-turned-Christian, used his talents to illustrate the power of the Gospel. He ended the program by giving his conversion story and also explained the difference between illusion (slight of hand) and mysticism.

The seminars, speakers, singing, and special features made for a great weekend for the over-600 people that attended.

Plan to attend CUC's festive evening March 9

Canadian Union College will host a festive evening on Sunday, March 9, 1986 in appreciation to those who contribute \$100 or more to the West Hall Renovation Matching Fund by March 9, 1986. The evening will begin with the official opening of the recently completed interior of the West Hall Fine Arts Centre. This will be followed by a reception for all guests and a special dinner program for all contributors of \$100 or more.

Receiving special recognition will be the Canadian Union College Committee of 100 who have provided \$60,000 toward West Hall renovation costs.

In addition to the \$60,000 Committee of 100 allocation, alumni and friends of CUC are being asked to give \$75,000 by March 9, 1986 to qualify for matching grants of \$75,000 from the seven Canadian conferences, and another \$75,000 from the Canadian Union. The target is to fully pay for the West Hall project by March 9, 1986. Membership in the Committee of 100 is open to all who apply and contribute \$500 or more a year through the Committee. Applications and contributions may be made through the Office of Development at CUC.

The Canadian Union College Committee of 100 was established in 1973 and assumed a major roll in the planning and financing of the Physical Fitness Complex. In addition, the Committee of 100 assisted in funding the John McKibbin Edmucation Centre, the West Hall Fine Arts Centre, and provides rent assistance to student families who cannot find housing on campus.

Admission to the banquet will be by reservation only. Tickets may be obtained from Committee of 100 members or from the Office of Development, Box 439, College Heights, AB, TOC 0ZO. Phone (403) 782-3381. Reservations close at 5:00 p.m. on March 5.

The evening includes admission to a colourful performance by the 24-member Frulica Folk Troup from Yugoslavia. From 1931 until 1948 West Hall was one of the main attractions on the CJC Campus. A change came in 1948 when the ladies moved to their new home in Maple Hall and the men occupied West Hall.

cupied West Hall. From 1931 until December 1951 West Hall was home to the cafeteria located on the bottom floor.

bottom floor. In August 1980, when the ladies moved to Lakeview Hall, the men quickly vacated West Hall and took possession of Maple Hall. West Hall did not remain

West Hall did not remain empty for long. The choir claimed the worship room for their rehearsals. Walls were removed in the dean's apartment to open an area for band practice. Rooms became music teachers' studios, practice rooms, teachers' offices, graphic arts lab, mail room, radio station, etc. West Hall was busy from early morning to late at night. Though much the worse for wear, it began to be known as the Fine Arts Centre.

Centre. The change of usage in 1980 necessitated gaining permission from the building safety office. Even though daytime office and classroom use decreased the risk in West Hall, fire safety regulations require that a change of usage obligates the owner to comply with current safety standards.

The building inspector provided a long list of conditions that must be met. Lack of cash made it impossible to do anything more

than the bare minimum. Then in April 1985 the blow fell. The building inspector's ultimatum required the work to be completed by August 1985 or we would not be allowed to use the building when school opened in September.

An engineer's report assured that West Hall, built with solid concrete outside walls, was sound and well worth restoring.

Experience in transforming the dilapidated "Old Gym" into the attractive and functional John McKibbin Education Centre gave Dr. Reo Ganson confidence that West Hall could be restored. Immediately he drew up plans for a metamorphosis that would create a Fine Arts Centre worthy of the distinguished history of West Hall.

Cost estimates revealed that to do a mere patch-up job to meet minimum requirements would cost in excess of \$50,000. To do a firstclass restoration inside and out would require about \$200,000.

Plans were presented to the Board of Trustees. The full restoration and a twoyear plan of financing were approved.

When work began in June, 1985, it soon became evident that some extra work would be required. For instance, the roof structure had to be strengthened and insulated. The heating system must be replaced. This altered the work schedule and escalated costs to \$285,000. Inside work is now vir-

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Inside work is now virtually complete. West Hall is alive with the sound of music.

Outside restoration will take place in July and August 1986 if funds are available on time.

Already nearly \$200,000 has been spent in West Hall. It's a bargain for the type of building we now have, but this unexpected, yet necessary expense has caused a severe lack of cash at CUC.

A plan was voted at the December 2, 1985 CUC Board of Trustees meeting to speed up the financing with the aim to have all the cash in hand by March 9, 1986, when the CUC Constituency meets.

The new plan of financing involves the Canadian Union, the seven Canadian Conferences, the CUC Committee of 100, and the CUC Development Office. Our share to raise through the Development Office is \$75,000. This is a challenge, but with God's help we are confident that portion will be in hand by March 9.

The prospects of having a completely new West Hall Fine Arts Centre fully paid for is exciting. The provision of this fine facility at a fraction of its value is good business.

is good business. What last April caused such concern is becoming, not without considerable sacrifice, a great blessing to our campus.

STAFF is an acronym standing for Steps To Active Family Fun, if your family night is devoted to play-. ing games with each other.

> Steps To Airing Family Feelings might be what STAFF means to you, if your children are older and you enjoy a council-discussion type meeting.

> Whatever you may plan, dedicate one evening a week to your family. Don't hesitate to tell others, "I'm sorry, I've got a STAFF meeting that night. - Parent Scene

> TEACHING TOTS. Take a walk through town. Give yourself an hour, but don't be rigid. Let your child

lead you to what he is interested in. If it is watching the caterpillar inch its way along the curb, don't hurry on until your child is ready.

Watch for the learning opportunities that you usually miss when your child accompanies you on shopping trips - the baker decorating a cake; the hydraulic lift at the service station; the pets-for-sale in the pet store; the "wait" and "walk" traffic signals: etc.

Taking a walk through town requires no special planning, no advance training. It can be the richest curriculum that you can possibly provide for a young child.

- Parent Scene SABBATH AFTERNOON WALK. We have found that the same idea as was mentioned above holds for the Sabbath afternoon walk in nature. Take time while walking. There are so many interesting things to stop and look at and learn about.

Many times as I have been walking with my family, I've prayed silently that God would show us some little part of His creation, and He has never failed.

Last month right in Red Deer at one of the parks we were able to get within 6 feet of a Peleated woodpecker (a large, relatively shy, uncommon bird) and see the brilliant colors close up. At family worship that evening we were able to thank God for that special sight.


