Unusual Happenings in Edmonton Spanish

Strange happenings are occurring in the fastest growing segment of the Alberta Conference membership. We are referring to the one that speaks the "language of Heaven" - Spanish. Ten new members were added to the church between December of last year and February of this year. Many of the cases were of tremendous inspiration to everyone.

There was the case of Jose and Coralia Mejia who met each other and together met the Lord. They decided to be married and baptized together in the same evening! So Pastor Schulz united them before the Lord and immediately afterwards he united them with God in a very touching baptism. All in a matter of an hour! Today both are active members of the Edmonton Spanish church.

There is also the story of the young person whose two parents died in a tragic car accident during the same day. His second 'father',

a clergyman in whom he confided sincerely, tried to abuse him sexually. This young person, in a state of total shock, lost all confidence in his church, in its ministry, and even his faith in God was shaken very badly. But thirteen years later, he met the real Christ in whom we can all trust. He met the church that keeps the commandments. Without anyone knowing his story, (even other members of this family), he observed the members, scrutinized the church pastor, and was convinced of the sincerity and honesty displayed in the church. Soon afterward he carefully studied the doctrines of the church, was convinced by them and was shortly immersed in the baptismal waters by Pastor Schulz.

Another unusual story is that of another young person who put all his enthusiasm and dedication into the guerilla activities in his country. He became a leading instructor of



As their last convention, held in Mexico, the ASI motto was "Making God Look Good", said Elder Lawton Lowe, Vice-President for the SDA Church in Canada and also coordinator for ASI. He is aiming at 100 applications in Canada by the time of the ASI convention in August in Calgary.

Henry Martin, who owns a Mercedes dealership in Grant's Pass, Oregon, was voted the president of ASI International at the convention in Mexico. "In his acceptance speech he set the associations goal for 1988 - "Reaching the Unreachable". (W.C. Johnson reporting in the Adventist Review, Jan. 21, 1988, p.4)

The ASI members are very cooperative with the church and its leadership, said Johnson in the Review. "Last year, among other projects, members provided funding for the Revelation Seminar Materials to be translated into French for the Quebec Conference.

Elder Lowe is looking for some chapters to be organized in Canada to be accepted at the Calgary convention August 3-6. He is well on his way to his goal of 100 applicants. The constitution and guidelines of the ASI are formulated by the members of the ASI and not by the church. Edmonton South Book Ministry

Five hundred seventy three thousand, nine hundred and eighty people was the population in Edmonton in 1986 according to the 1986 census. The Lord wants every one of these people to know the love of Christ before He comes and a group of youth in South Edmonton Church is excited to be involved in reaching this goal.

One evening in November, 1986, Darrel Beaudoin, Dave Beaudoin, and Paul Dempsey were studying the Bible together. They had a real burden to go and tell people of the soon return of Jesus, and that they too could experience the joy He has to give. The Ingathering at the time gave them courage and experience to go door to door with literature to whoever was willing to accept it. After a few times out, the desire became so overwhelming

that they began going out as often as possible.

When it was mentioned to the study group that meets every Sabbath evening, they thought it was a great idea. They did some searching to see which book would be best to distribute and found that Ellen White desired that the book "The Great Controversy" should be placed in every home. It was then decided to start going door to door in the Millwoods district first. They obtained maps from the City Planning Department to keep track of the areas completed. To date, about two-thirds of the Millwoods district (population approx. 45,000) has been covered. The full fruits of this ministry will never be known until Jesus returns, but there has already been one baptism as a result. Tom Carne received "The Great Controversy" and then later

saw one sitting on the table at his boss' home. The third time Tom saw this book was in a book rack at the chiropractor's office. This impressed Tom so much that he read the book twice. He also attended the Evangelistic series held by Verne Snow in the spring of '87 and was baptized. Others have also inquired about the Church and its teachings as a result of the Book Ministry.

The faithful people, who have been going out on a regular basis every Sunday at noon, and weekdays on their own time, have been richly blessed. They have been invited into homes to share, give Bible studies, and pray. May the Lord bless abundantly this ministry and provide many laborers to work for Him that the harvest may be rich and abundant.

Reorganization to Strengthen Outreach

The Adventist Media Center Board of Trustees voted on January 13 to implement a more centralized form of management for the radio and television ministries.

All present ministries located on the Thousand Oaks, California, campus - Breath of Life, Faith for Today, It Is Written, La Voz de la Esperanza, and Voice of Prophecy - will continue their unique evangelistic missions with strong leadership from the speakers. Each ministry will still be responsible for raising its own financial support.

"Our five present ministries are alive and well," emphasized Elder Bob E. Jacobs, president of the Adventist Media Center. "Each has exciting plans for expansion in 1988. Our church family can be assured that their gifts to a particular ministry will, as before, go directly to that ministry. And their financial support is just as important as ever."

In the new organizational plan, each speaker will have a group of associated working directly with him for the ministry under the leadership of the Center president. Three vice-presidents - for evangelism, finance, and operations - will oversee a coordinated operational staff that will provide services to the individual ministries.

The Center's new structure is designed to strengthen the current ministries and prepare the way for the production of several new outreaches, including spot promotions, a program targeting young adults, and radio ministry for teens. A newly created position, director of new program development, will report directly to the Center president

"The Seventh-day Adventist Church is vitally interested in using the airwaves to spread the gospel," says Jacobs. "We believe this plan will help strengthen the church's media ministries."

The meetings began in the center of Palmer at the old train depot and were later moved to the church. The evangelist was Elder Verne Snow. Ask any member of the church in Palmer, including those newly baptized members, and they will tell you that Verne Snow is a powerful and decisive speaker. His genuine concern and sincerity combined with the urgency of the message brings decisions. But before there can be decisions, there must be people.

Although we advertised in the paper, put up posters, and sent out meeting announcements as well as 200 personal letters of invitation, most of those baptized had had a previous acquaintance with church members and many had attended church, at least occasionally. Some of the members had been working with Pastor Don Kack in visitation and Bible studies.

At the end of 1987 and the beginning of 1988, some of us from Alberta had an opportunity to participate in the L.E. institute in New York state. On Sabbath, January 2, 1988 we filled two buses and visited some significant places in New York: Palmyra-Hill Comorah, the birthplace of Mormonism, and the Fox sisters house at Hydesville, the birthplace of modern spiritualism. We stopped by the cornfield where Hiram Edson had his sanctuary revelation vision the day after the October 22, 1844 disappointment. We also worshipped in the oldest SDA church which is in Roosevelt. It was here Ellen White had one of her important visions.

As we visited Mt. Hope Cemetery in Rochester where many of our early pioneers are buried, we had some time for contemplation, particularly in front of the graves of Mary and Angeline Andrews. Shortly after J. N. Andrews had lost his wife, he left with his daughter and son for Europe to be the first official missionary of the SDA church. In a few short years, he also lost his daughter and then died prematurely from overwork, possibly caused by his double grief. Then we thought of Jesus and how He left His heavenly family to come to this unthankful world to be misunderstood, unappreciated, and rejected by those He loved and came to save, finally to die of a broken heart. By comparison God asks such small sacrifices from us today. Our pioneers had such dedication as they cheerfully pressed on in God's work in the

midst of loss, bereavement and poverty as they followed the Crucified One

Determination sprang in our hearts to follow their example more closely, uncomplainingly, even joyfully. Soon Jesus is to come to put an end to all human woes, disappointments and hurts. He will make all things right. In the meantime, He is sending us to the hurting world around us with a message of peace, love, and healing. This is what literature evangelism is all about.



About 75% of the membership of the Edmonton Spanish church is under 25 years of age. It is a dynamic group that is growing at a fast pace in Alberta. Careful plans are being laid out for continuous growth. Aggressive outreach plans are being traced. Among the plans that this active group has is the continuous nurturing of the young people of the church, so arrangements were made to bring Elder Israel Leito, associate director of the Youth Department of the General Conference, to Edmonton. It was a blessed occurrence on February 6 when he addressed the church and the youth, one that the membership will never forget.

Human Relations Committee Report

The Human Relations Committee is made up of individuals within our conference who represent a minority group. Members serving on this committee at the present time are Clarence Baptiste, chairman, of Edmonton; Rudy Bailey of Medicine Hat; John Blake of Beauvallon; Cynthia Campbell of Calgary; Wallace Cyrus of Edmonton; Ed Desjarlais of College Heights; Frank Ennis of Lloydminster; Sudha Medavarapu of Drumheller: Victor Schultz of Edmonton; Warren Trenchard of College Heights; Basil VanDieman of Wetaskiwin; and Won Chul Yi of Calgary. Our president Don Corkum also meets with us.

This committee meets at least once a quarter. We give study to items that come to us relating to human relations issues (within the approved terms of reference) and we make recommendations to the Conference Executive Committee. Our terms of reference are as fol-

1. Definition: The term "human

relations" as used in this document refers to issues concerning minorities, whether in quantity or quality, with regard to church governance, structure, and function. This includes relations between minority ethnic groups and the majority ethnic group, between women and men, and between handicapped persons and the non-handicapped persons.

2. The <u>functions</u> of the Human Relations Committee are:

a. to develop educational programs, experiences, and materials regarding human relations for the conference, churches, pastors, and individuals.

b. to consider human relations issues that are brought to it by the conference executive committee, churches, pastors, or individuals or are generated within the committee.

c. to advise the conference executive committee on matters concerning human relations and to recommend to it programs, policies, and decisions regarding it items arising from either 2a or 2b.

The goal of the Committee is to be proactive rather than reactive. In this way we attempt to deal with issues that could cause problems. We, therefore, are working toward a continued united and harmonious relationship. Our aim is to have representatives on our committee from all minority ethnic groups and others so that all concerns can be presented. As is stated in our terms of reference, we also consider the needs and concerns of the handicapped. It is our hope to present highlights from our various ethnic and cultural minorities and the handicapped from time to time. Even though we are different, we are one people and we have one prayer objective which is working toward revival and reformation in our own lives and that of all who will be ready for the return of Christ. May we all keep close to Jesus and may His love fill us so much day by day that His peace will abide with

MULTICULTURALISM, CONT...

Human Relations and the Handicapped

The "Terms of Reference" as passed by the Conference Committee includes not only ethnic and other minorities, but also relations between handicapped and non-handicapped persons.

The Conference Committee has asked Elder John Blake to join the Human Relations Committee and especially represent the needs of the handicapped. It was felt that Elder Blake's experience with the hearing handicapped could be a help in the committee's concerns about all handicapped persons.

Who are the "handicapped"? Webster classes these as those with a disadvantage that renders success more difficult. This could cover a very large number of problems: the blind, the deaf, the paraplegic and quadriplegic, the mentally handicapped, those with severe and prolonged mental illness, etc.

For 87 years the Christian Record has worked especially for the blind. In 1981 the General Conference also asked them to add the Hearing Handicapped to their special ministry. At the moment, we are not aware of any Adventist agency that works specifically for those with other handicaps. Elder Blake feels that a "CARING CHURCH" also needs a ministry to all handicapped persons.

In his paper to the Human Relations Committee, Blake urges us as SDA's to help the handicapped live as normal a life as possible, to treat each handicapped person with respect and dignity, and that the Church work toward providing special facilities, wherever needed, so that the handicapped can enjoy the same church services and programs as the non-handicapped.

What would be examples of what the CARING CHURCH can do to provide extra helps? Wheelchair ramps and specially adapted bathrooms for our paraplegic members, special FM hearing aid devices for the mildly to moderate deaf, Sign Language interpretation and Signed video tapes for the severely deaf, more Easy English publications similar to the Sabbath School "Easy English" edition of the quarterly, felts and visual aids for the mentally handicapped, and large print books and magazines, audio tapes and Braille materials for the visually impaired.

How can our CARING CHURCH begin to meet these needs? First, we need to know what are the "felt needs" of all our handicapped members. Secondly, we must investigate how these needs may best be met. Thirdly, we need to incorporate the services of the Christian Record more into the

mainstream of the church so we can work together in special evangelism for handicapped peoples. It has even been suggested that there be an Adventist Association of the Handicapped.

Perhaps the most important thing is that methods of education be devised to help all our members get the feel of what it is like to be handicapped. This will help build empathy and concern for the needs as actually felt by the handicapped. Some ways this can be accomplished are through audioslide presentations and awareness programs about different types of handicaps.

Once we "care how they feel" our hearts and minds will be ready to reach out with a "specially adapted" hand to help those with a handicap.

Our new Canadian constitution spells out our human rights. For the deaf person it identifies a right for all deaf in court to have an "Interpreter" so they can know what is going on if being tried. What about each handicapped person's "divine right" to know what is going to go on in the Heavenly courts? Surely Adventists should be leaders in meeting the needs of all groups as we prepare for our Heavenly Judgement!




Darcy Plewes received the highest mark in two semesters of grade 10 Industrial Education.

"Are you a wise shopper?" ask the Pathfinders. The Pathfinder uniform represents commitment and service to God and humanity. The Pathfinder Club is dedicated to train young people to learn the meaning of true Christianity - salvation by grace through faith with the fruits of commitment to God and service to mankind.

Parents of children in Seventhday Adventist Schools in Alberta have every reason to be pleased with the results of achievement tests taken by their students near the beginning of the current school

In terms of grade-equivalents, the students tested ahead of their actual grade placements in most categories and were below their actual grade placements in no categories. In terms of percentile rankings, the student averages for the entire Conference were

generally in the 80 to 90 range. To understand these figures, it is helpful to note that the 50th percentile is the average - or median - for all school students of these grade levels in Canada. Percentiles rank students as to how they compare with the general Canadian student population.

Church School Students Score Well

Each year all students in Alberta's Adventist Schools in grades three through ten are tested with the Canadian Tests of Basic Skills. These tests attempt to determine how well students achieve in the

reading of Canadian English, in the use of language skills, in workstudy skills, and mathematics. The tests are given to students in their home rooms and are then sent to a central computerized station where they are scored and rated.

This year's results are satisfying and will tend to make parents proud of their students, their teachers, and their schools. The test results are an indication that, in terms of academic achievement, church schools are highly successful.
