Beth Tehillah Vetikva, House of Praise and Hope, is the first contextualized Jewish Ministries outreach in Canada and is supported by the Camrose SDA Church, the Alberta Conference, and NAD Jewish Ministries. Begun in September 2012, the fellowship reaches out to Jewish and Gentile seekers wanting to gain deeper insights into the Hebrew roots of the Christian faith and to provide a familiar worship experience for those of Jewish ancestry wishing to explore Jesus as the Messiah of Israel.

The Wainwright Adventist church fellowship is a group forming in a community that is new to an Adventist presence. This is an outreach of the Sedgewick Seventh-day Adventist Church and Phil Brick is the lay leader of this group. There are also plans to have a VOAR radio station established in the community. A church congregation in town not of



the Adventist denomination has agreed to locate the tower on their property.

The 2013 Story Continues---

- Recently the board of both Edmonton Central and Edmonton South Churches voted to begin the process of establishing new congregations. These churches are both filled to capacity on Sabbath morning and members of both of these churches are sensing God's call to be a part of a new work in ministering to the Edmonton area.
- Calgary area churches are also expressing a desire to be a part of expanding God's work. On September 13 and 14 a church planting rally will be held in the city of Calgary (see the advertisement later in this newsletter).
- The conference has voted to establish work in 8 cities by 2016 that currently have no Adventist presence: Fort Saskatchewan, Beaumont, High River, Cochrane, Chestermere, Stony Plain, Cold Lake, Okotoks. There will be an attempt to provide Bible Workers/Church Planters for each of these new areas.
- There is also work to rebirth churches with low attendance as Drumheller which has tripled it attendance over the past couple years. This is due to a vision of the church and pastor and also a very effective Bible worker. We must add that it is God and His power that we must thank—it is truly His vision and His power!! We praise God.
- The Change School of Evangelism has about 17 students enrolled for a 3 month training period. This includes both classroom and field experience. The last part of the field experience will be working in an evangelistic outreach.
- We pray for communities with a small Adventist presence that continue to endeavor to start a new work as Slave Lake and Grand Cache. If there are members or churches that would like to provide support for these new areas please contact Don <u>Corkum—</u> <u>dcorkum1@msn.com</u> and 403-669-0706.

Marks of a praying church

First, members have a strong devotional life and invest time praying for others.

Second, they understand who God is and how they can relate to Him through prayer.

Third, leaders model the importance of prayer before the congregation.

Fourth, Prayer permeates total church life and is not viewed as another program.

Fifth, high priority is placed on corporate prayer meetings.

Sixth, investing time in God's presence results in humility, unity, and Christlikeness.

Seventh, and the most distinguishing mark, the presence of God fills His house.
