Kenya Deaf Camp Meeting With 226 Attending

A Large 2014 Camp Meeting in Kenya

A large double Union Camp meeting for the Deaf in Kenya was held in August 24-30, 2014 with 226 deaf, leaders and interpreters in attendance. On the Sabbath of camp, 43 deaf were baptized and 99 graduated from the VOP Discover Bible School.

Elder Paul Muasya, Special Needs Coordinator for both Kenya Unions writes:

"Topics handled included Family Life, Health, Adventist church structure, Stewardship, Prophecy, Bible study and reports of deaf work in other parts of the world by Maren [a volunteer teacher of the Deaf helping in Kenya] from Germany, and her sister [deaf].

Most of the topics were handled by the Deaf who are studying theology in our university. Pastor E. Musoni East Central Division Special Needs Ministries Director was our guest speaker.

The Deaf also had time to sing in sign

language, share their experiences and challenges and to pray and play together. On Friday we took them to tour the city climaxing at the Nairobi Animal orphanage."

Many testified that they were blessed and look forward to other joint meetings in the future.

Currently there are eight Gospel Outreach [GO] lay workers in Kenya. There has also been help through the years given by Mrs. Witness from Mombasa. And, if it were not for both Elder Paul Muasya from the Union level, and lay deaf GO coordinator, Henry Kamau, there would probably today be little work for the Deaf in Kenya! Elder Muasya did a lot of organizing and the Conferences helped financially to get this country-wide meeting accomplished! So, we are so thankful and praise God for how He is working through many people to bless the Deaf!

The Deaf Young Adults for Christ, DYAC, joined us this year. They had their own workshops with Chuck McGehee (Vancouver, WA) as their speaker. Adventist interpreters joined our camp meeting and also had their own workshops with Darrell & Lorna Strait (Loma Linda, CA) and Nohe

James (Sumner, WA). These two special groups came from all over the country to join *Southern Deaf Camp Meeting*. A total of about 20 deaf young adults and 12 interpreters attended.

During the afternoon break out activities, individuals had three options: join a Bible class with David Trexler (Lanham, MD), take a health class with Bethany Adner (Indianapolis,, IN), or participate in outdoor activities (torpedo boat rides, swimming, riding the zip line, ride the big flying chair, or go horseback riding).

We celebrated the Sabbath with a communion service and inspirational testimonies, Friday evening. We enjoyed a spirit filled Sabbath School and worship service Sabbath morning. After lunch, our large group gathered at the front of the lake and witnessed five individuals as they were baptized! Our time together was filled with sweet fellowship filled with the Holy Spirit. Our hearts are filled with encouragement ready to return to our many different states and countries. It can be very lonely and isolating to go back to our homes."

Two New Classrooms Added at Kisii Kenya SDA Deaf School

Opening of a new section of the Kisii SDA Deaf School By John Blake

Dr. Larry Evans of the General Conference, and Elders Trexler, Kay and I visited several deaf schools in 2012 in western Kenya (not far from Lake Victoria). We saw many deaf young people and children from SDA homes and there was a baptism of over 40 deaf young people.

Conference and church leaders under the leadership of Elder Paul Muasya, (currently Union Special Ministries Coordinator), worked on plans for a new SDA school for the Deaf near Kisii. Funds were obtained from various sources including \$10,000 from Canada, and a two room school was built. Further funds have just enabled the adding of two more classrooms. Dr. Larry Evans, from the General Conference, visited this new school in August and cut the ribbon opening the new section of the expanded deaf school. He says that this school is the "first denominationally run Deafschool on the continent of Africa. This is a major milestone."

The property for this school has been given by a mother who lost her own daughter, Martha Okioma. Martha wanted to do something special in honor

of her daughter, Milcah. She is also highly involved in helping in the program of caring for students!

Extra building funds have been building up here in Alberta at "A Better World" and will be sent when the correct reports are processed.

Deaf in Mindanao in the Philippines has almost doubled in attendance from 7 vary in age from 11 to 47 years old.

The reason for the vast difference in home. age is that these students have had little **RICE TERRACES** or no chance at schooling in sign language. They are not only learning to read and write, but perfecting their learning of signs as well.

We have been staying temporarily with the girls in the dormitory as we have become their home deans. Our things in our MVC home at SULADS campus are just locked for rats to nest on for some time. But now we have finally moved our things to the deaf school emptying our house at MVC to live permanently with the Deaf at the new school. As we were hauling our things one early evening, Dave our youngestboy burst into tears as we were

perched on our things on the truck. What's the matter. Dave? (I checked). I hugged him tight as he answered me with just his sobs. I kept on hugging consoling him silently.

Later on he was able to gather himself up wiping his tears away and said. This has been my home since I was a little tvke, wasn't it daddy? Why do we have to move?

We are a missionary family, I told him. We The SULADS Adventist school for the are just a passing through here. Our permanent home is in heaven. It was a plan at first to have just a miniature small rice terrace for landscape and beauty in the campus. Just making use of the excess water that ran through an unkept slope. We, then, together with the children, made our hands and feet beautifully dirty with mud as we enjoyed putting our efforts together to make this landscape. We had fun making every box of rice paddy into a different shape and size according to the contour of the slope running after the water level.

We raked, pulled weeds, mashed them underfoot and made sticky mud. We squirted mud on our faces, pulled bloody hungry leeches sticking on our feet as the girls cry for help. We laughed, making our work fun. To our surprise we finished thirteen boxes of rice paddies. The ...joy is to see the good sturdy, healthy dark green rice standing, promising a good harvest.



Classes at Philippine Deaf School THIRTEEN STUDENTS

We expected 15 students this school year. More than fifteen came to enrol. Some called that they will come. One nine year old boy came with his father with all papers ready for enrolment. The boy was just like a leech sticking to his father's arm. As our students entertained him - as deaf children do in their language, they become friends and before, he knew it he was with the kids playing and enjoying around.

Oh! What magic! The father said. This boy will never release his grip from me whenever I am with strangers. This is my first time to see him like this. I think he will like it here. He found his family the Deaf, I assured him.

Do you think he will just be well if I go home now and leave him with you here? He asked. I will just come back tomorrow to bring his things, Yes, everything will be okay I promised.

He left - hiding somewhere in the bush to see if the boy will not look for him. When the boy sensed that his father was gone, he stormed crying wailing, shouting, stomping on the ground. Later the father came out from his hiding place and the boy was relieved to go back to his grip again.

The father promised that they will be back the following morning. They never came. Later we received word that they were supposed to come and the boy's mind was set to stay in school. When they, the father and son were already ready to come, the mother exploded crying for her boy thinking that her dear boy will be away for the first time. They never made it.

Another mother promised to send her girl. They never came.

Now, we have only thirteen officially enrolled. Seven girls and six boys. I mean they are still boys and girls in their kindergarten and grade level but actually one is already 47 years old, another is 37, 25, etc., and our youngest is 11.

CRISEL IS BAPTIZED

When Crisel's parents knew that she is attending a Seventh-day Adventist School for the Deaf and knowing that their daughter was enjoying and learning many things in school, the father looked for a minister and asked for Bible Study. Together with his wife and children, he got baptized.

During the summer, when we were in Manila for schooling in Sign language, and the children joined their families for the summer vacation, they had Crisel baptized.

OTHER STUDENTS READY FOR **BAPTISM**

Crisel was all joy sharing her experience during the summer and especially when she was baptized to join her family. When her classmates heard that, they too expressed their desire to be baptized. Joeffrey butted in right away that an Angel bid him to be baptized just the way you were baptized immersed in water, he told Crisel. Now in our everyday class lesson in values, I have them in one class every morning to prepare them for baptism. [Report Continues...]

Southern Deaf Fellowship has weekly Sabbath services 'live' online.

Yet, there is still so much to do. We need to plead for the Holy Spirit to guide us in what to do next. We need to dream His dreams, then plan and move ahead as His providences open the way!

Updating "Can You Hear Us?

Three Angels Deaf Ministries [3ADM] has recently updated a booklet to help hearing people become a little more acquainted with the Deafamong us. Can You Hear Us? is a concise 24-page booklet on deafness, Deaf culture, and Deaf ministry. It is written for the average hearing church member who may not know much about Deaf people. The booklet is not only for those hearing people who are learning ASL and want to become involved in Deaf ministry; instead, this is for every hearing member. For, as the booklet emphasizes, everyone has a part to play in Deaf ministry as we are all one large family of God.

Its author is Esther Doss, a child of Deaf Adults (CODA). She writes from her unique perspective of living between both the Deaf and hearing worlds and her eye-witness accounts of the Deaf experience. The booklet includes myths and facts about Deaf people, what video phones are and how to call a Deaf person, how to use an interpreter, suggestions for how to become Deaffriendly, and more.

The earlier version had an impact on our church. The former North American Division President Don Schneider read the booklet and was so moved that he asked David Trexler and Esther Doss to appear on his Hope TV program *Really Living*. Hearing individuals continually tell us, "I learned so much from that little book."

"The hearing world that we live in today is vastly different than the one I grew up in," Esther states. "They are far more interested in learning about the unique Deaf culture and find that American Sign Language is indeed a beautiful language. They are starting to overcome their fear of those who are different just because their ears do not hear. This is the time to educate hearing people so that God's work among the Deaf can move forward in a mighty way."



Update October 2014

In 1997 ministry for the Deaf was no longer part of Christian Record Services. Since that time the North American Division has provided an annual financial appropriation for the Deaf work but oversight was left to various supportive ministries. There were no coordinated efforts to reach out to the global Deaf until 2011. Doors began to open as the General Conference began to promote an awareness of the ministry needs for the estimated 240 million culturally Deaf. It is believed that only 2% of these Deaf are Christian regardless of denomination. It is truly an unreached mission field. However, in a relatively short time, a number of significant developments have taken place.

- All 13 of the world divisions of the General Conference now have a liaison for Deaf ministries. The General Conference has drafted a global strategic plan for expanding ministry for and with the Deaf.
- The second largest baptism of Deaf on a single Sabbath occurred in 2012 (Kenya). Gospel Outreach workers and the 3 Angels Deaf Ministries organization provided training sessions that helped make this possible. The General Conference assisted in coordinating the meetings.
- Growth among the Deaf is taking place in some areas of the world! In 2007 there were 18 Deaf Adventists attending church in Kenya. Since then 445 Deaf have been baptized and nearly 1,000 are now attending church each Sabbath. The first denominational school for the deaf on the continent of Africa was built and opened this year.
- Thanks to the visionary leadership in Kenya, 5 are attending an African university to be trained as pastors for the Deaf—three of whom are deaf themselves.
- The General Conference has accepted a new name and logo for Deaf ministries—Adventist Deaf Ministries International. This is important as it will help unify global efforts.
- A new Deaf website has been launched for the Deaf and for those who are hearing but who wish to participate in Deaf outreach. The General Conference is funding the work of Amanda Collgan who serves as the Web Content Manager. (www.AdventistDeaf.org)
- Some divisions have conducted Deaf advisories to acquaint union leaders with Deaf ministry. These have been well received.
- It is anticipated that in 2015 funding for an internet TV channel will be provided for the Deaf. Arrangements are being made with the Romanian media center and Hope Channel for subtitling past programs.
- The first General Conference sponsored booth for the Deaf will be featured at the coming General Conference Session.

Momentum is building but so much still needs to be done. Your prayers and support are greatly needed. I wish to personally thank Gospel Outreach for partnering with us! What you have done won't be fully appreciated this side heaven but your efforts for the Deaf has made and is making a major difference. Great days are ahead!

TWO PRECIOUS SDA DEAF SCHOOLS!



The Mindanao Philippine SULADS Deaf School



This school is now in it's 2nd year at the new location out in the country. There are 13 students varying in age from 11 to 47 years old. The reason for the great difference in age is that some students have had little or no opportunity to go to school because they are Deaf.

The school is owned by the SULADS student missionary organization which is an official part of the SDA church in the Philippines.

They now have (1) a small home originally used for workers and storing tools (2) a fairly large administration/classroom building (3) A dormitory now housing both boys and girls (4) a kitchen attached to the dorm, (5) a separate outdoor well built bathroom (6) a water supply with concrete reservoir tank with a gravity feed down to the school.

They need more housing which is one of the greatest needs at this time.

Kenya School Summary

This school is under the direction of the SDA church in Kenya. Elder Paul Muasyahas been one of the guiding lights behind this project. Earlier, Paul was the Union President, but currently is the Disabilities/Special Needs Director and is in charge of deaf work for both Unions in Kenya.

At time of writing, a German SDA teacher of the Deaf has taken part of her Sabbatical from teaching and is helping with the school. Her name is Maren Wohler. She will also be visiting other areas in Kenya. Her parents and both her sisters are also Deaf. One ofher sisters has recently also spent time with Maren in Kenya.

Three or four of the students at the deaf school are 'orphans' There is a real need now for housing for the students. Henry Kamau, Kenya Coordinator, has told us of the need and is *anxious* to find funding to properly house the students.
