CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS

Excitement continues to build at the MANS School construction site! Llew Werner, Building Committee Chair, informs us that both the exterior school walls and the gym walls will be constructed with pre-cast concrete sections. In addition to having very good fire resistance and durability, the pre-cast wall sections also have a substantial layer of high density foam insulation "sandwiched" in the middle of each section which will result in a warm school.

The gym walls were raised first and the gym roof trusses installed and then the exterior walls and trusses will be installed. The roof will be sheeted and clad with metal roofing material.
