A BETTER WORLD GRANT EXPANDS AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

A recent \$10,000 contribution by A Better World to the After School Program component of The Bridge Campaign created the opportunity for a Burman University student to gain leadership experience in MANS' After School Program – Sports Section. The grant also allowed MANS to extend its Grade 10 Environmental Education class into after school hours, and to make parts of the class content available to any student.

The goal of the after school program is to keep children in a safe environment during a critical time of day when they're more likely to be exposed to gangs.

CANADIAN WELDING ASSOC. FOUNDATION MAKES MAJOR GIFT TO CAMPAIGN



The Canadian Welding Association Foundation (CWF) has committed \$350,000 to the Bridge Campaign. The gift will establish a welding program at Mamawi Atosketan Native School (MANS). The foundation's gift and commitment to an on-going relationship makes welding the flagship program of the Industrial Arts Centre of the new high school.

CWF Executive Director Deborah Mates recommended the gift and partnership to the CWF board after visiting MANS at the end of June. "What I saw [at MANS] was a different group of kids," says Mates, who visited First Nations schools across Canada, "very different from what I've seen in any other aboriginal community. They're focused, they're engaged, and I know it's because of the teachers."

MANS Vice Principal Mike Willing and five MANS students were sponsored by the CWF at its week-long "Mind Over Metal" welding summer camp in August.

MANS STUDENTS GET ACTIVE IN FUNDRAISING!

On December 4, Pastor Lyle Notice, Assistant Director of the Alberta Conference Youth Department, donned his super hero cloak and brushed up his acting skills to launch SUPER MANS (Small Useful People Expanding Resources for MANS) at Mamawi Atosketan Native School.

The students enjoyed the antics of SUPER MANS and his sidekick Luke Bannis, who played a student facing the challenges many MANS students face. Students responded enthusiastically to the invitation to participate in fundraising for their new school.

SUPER MANS, an entrepreneur-style initiative of the Alberta Conference, encourages kids to use their power to do good by helping to build MANS' new high school. The purpose of the new school is to allow First Nations kids who attend the over-crowded school to stay in the unique environment that increases their chances of completing high school.

"SUPER MANS is also a superhero that helps kids realize they're not alone and that they can make a difference," said Pastor Lyle. "They have the power to do good. If SUPER MANS helps them to realize that, I'll play SUPER MANS all day long!" he smiles. The event was covered by *The Lacombe Express* (Dec. 17 issue).

MANS students and their families are already getting involved. The first SUPER MANS fundraiser will be held January 28—a hot lunch put on by the Grade 4 class that's open to the entire school community. Their teacher, Russ Nielsen, began brainstorming fundraising ideas with the class immediately after SUPER MANS' appearance, and is organizing the class to help with food preparation, lunch delivery, and cleanup.
